Port Clinton, Ohio.....a summary

First of all, again we would like to thank Dick Bland for putting together a great reunion! The weather was good, new friendships were created and everyone was kept busy with the activities. Great job, Dick!

Upon arriving in Port Clinton, west of Cleveland and east of Toledo and nestled along the shoreline of Lake Erie, we had dinner at the historic Mon Ami restaurant and winery. The entire group received a personalized tour of the wine cellars and later enjoyed a great dinner. Wednesday greeted us with sunshine and a jet powered catamaran ride to South Bass Island and Put-in-Bay. We marveled at the island's collection of attractions. Most important was the memorial to Oliver Hazard Perry. On Sept. 10, 1813, Commodore Perry defeated and captured a British fleet just a few miles northwest of the memorial. The Battle of Lake Erie proved to be a turning point of the War of 1812. Perry's victory is commemorated at this Peace Memorial, the third tallest national monument in the U.S.A.

This proved a fitting location to salute our deceased Noxubee Shipmates. A ceremony was held that named each of the 40 shipmates who have passed away. This was followed by a 21-gun salute and a memorial service with a wreath In Memoriam, put in the waters of Lake Erie. A list of deceased shipmates can be found on our website.

The remainder of the day was spent touring the island on bicycles, walking or renting golf carts.

Thursday, the group split up. A chartered bus took some through Amish country, some went charter fishing while others remained back at the headquarters hotel and visited with fellow shipmates.

Amish trip:

On Thursday morning around 8:30, 30 members of the group boarded the bus for Amish country. The first stop was to pick up Dick Bland's daughter, Darlene, who was the unofficial tour guide. The bus went first to Mt. Hope, Ohio to the large Lehman's hardware store. Many items there were reminiscent of stores from the '30's and '40's. And what anyone couldn't find there, just across the street was the Amish auction and flea market. Lots of old and new stuff - much of it hand crafted in the Amish style.

The next stop was for lunch at the Amish Door restaurant for a lovely and wonderful lunch. Freshly baked bread and biscuits were absolutely delicious! Real country cooking! They also had a nice gift shop where I picked up some souvenirs for friends and family.
